

JUNE 23 ELECTION UPDATE--DISTRICT LEADER CURTIS ARLUCK

As this is written, we still do not have official results from the June 23 NY Primary. They were scheduled to be released August 4th, exactly six weeks from Election Day, but Federal Judge Analisa Torres just ordered the NY Board of Elections to count otherwise valid Absentee Ballots received June 24 regardless of postmark, and by June 25 even if not postmarked. This is a vital victory for democracy, but it will slow the vote counting even further. In every major contest, though, we do know the winners, including Congress Members Jerry Nadler, Adriano Espaillat, and Carolyn Maloney, Congressional candidates Ritchie Torres and Jamaal Bowman, and State Senator Robert Jackson. All but Maloney won by lopsided margins.

Our dictator-wannabe President claims that the June 23 election buttresses his "case" against more widespread Absentee Ballot voting. This, like almost everything he says, is a lie. There is no evidence whatsoever of fraud in absentee ballot voting, in this or any other election. In recent years, every single one of the infinitesimal proven instances of absentee ballot fraud has been committed by Republicans.But nevertheless, New York's current system for distributing and counting increased numbers of absentee ballots is entirely unsatisfactory. The Boards of Elections, especially in NYC, are underfunded, rife with election officials interested in sandbagging the election on the Republican side and not up to the job on the Democratic side. (This is largely not the case in Manhattan.) Picayune absentee ballot requirements ensure a far greater rejection rate of absentee ballots than of those cast on the machines. Antiquated election laws make vote counting that takes a week or two in other states take more than a month in New York. Unless the pandemic returns, voters in New York are strongly advised to vote in person in the General Election, either on November 3, or better yet in the Early Voting days leading up to the election.
